Based on years of research in France as well as in the United States, Unger's biography reveals how American ambassador James Monroe won Adrienne Lafayette's freedom and helped Lafayette's only son, George-Washington Lafayette, escape France to the safety of his godfather's home in Mount Vernon, even as the guillotine claimed his great-grandmother, grandmother, and aunt. Joseph Paul Yves Roche Gilbert du Motier, better known as the Marquis de Lafayette, is an icon of American - and French - history. Lafayette's life story is the stuff of legend. He was born into an aristocratic French family of warriors in the mid 18th century, commissioned a lieutenant in the French Royal Guard at age fourteen, and married into the royal family at sixteen. Enamored of the ideals of the American Revolution, he traveled to the colonies to join the cause.
